## The Reluctant Vicar

Rev Sally Letman came to talk to us 2 weeks ago about the change in her life from Dep Hd at Ipswich High School to Vicar. Eric Barnett takes up the story...

This was an entertaining and lively talk by the Rev. Sally Letman, Curate in Charge at St. Mary's Church, Capel St. Mary and St. John's, Great Wenham.

While describing herself as "a Reluctant Vicar" it was obvious from Sally`s references to her strong Christian faith why she would have pursued ordination in the Anglican Church following her retirement from the position of Assistant Head Teacher at Ipswich School for Girls. She reiterated on several occasions that she had always sought to live a life in Christ and as she put it, 'to walk with God'; she was also greatly impressed that the Rotary movement's ethos was encapsulated in its motto -'Service before Self'.

Following a reading of her favourite Psalm 121, Sally moved on to tell us of her experiences walking the Camino - the Road to Santiago de Compostela in Spain, in October 2021. There are in fact four or five recognised route starting from various

locations in Spain, Portugal and France. The one taken by Sally was about 350 miles in length.

She was in a group of fellow Christians who were strangers to each other initially but became mutually supportive as the walk progressed. Averaging about 18 miles per day Sally told us that she found the constant grind arduous and tiring leading to aching hips, knees and feet. Most of the route was tree-lined and for her it gave the impression of walking up the aisle of a church.

The last section of the walk was through Santiago itself and concluded with a final ascent up the steps to the cathedral of St. James on her knees as is the tradition.

Asked whether she would do the walk again, she replied, "Possibly yes, but would take longer to do it and make more of the experience of spirituality and companionship which it offered." In the meantime she did reveal that she had plans to follow the route of St. Cuthbert's Way from Holy Island to Iona, another fantastic long-distance walk.

# August Fifth Tuesday at Sizewell

In the week that Boris Johnson visited Sizewell to announce government funding for the construction of Sizewell C, it was appropriate that the club had an opportunity to see at first hand how this enormous construction project will impact the peace and tranquility as well as the precious flora and fauna of this part of Suffolk.

Under the expert guidance of Bob Findlay, an RSPB warden and Eastbridge resident with naturally strong views about the wisdom of building a new nuclear reactor on his doorstep, twenty Rotarians and partners set off from 'The Eels Foot' Public House on a beautiful late summer evening to walk the Sandlings path to Sizewell, armed with a map of the area overlaid with details of the construction area.

It was a sobering experience to learn that most of the land between Eastbridge and Sizewell will be used in some form or other for the construction project. We stopped several times along the route to hear Bob's detailed explanation as to how the landscape will change during the 10 to 15 years of the construction phase.

Ninety minutes of gentle rambling brought us to Sizewell Beach where we paused to reflect on how different the view would be in 15 years' time and to thank Bob for his expert guidance. By that stage, the thought of supper at the Eels Foot was obviously a paramount consideration for

some of our group as we made the remaining 3 miles back to the pub in one hour flat for an excellent evening of food and fellowship!



## The Old Boys' Network
