Dear Mark,

Thank you very much to you and all the members Ipswich East Rotary for your generous donation of £1,000 that was given to Lighthouse in July. Donations like these really do help Lighthouse ensure that we are able to provide the support that is so desperately needed.

As you know Lighthouse is a local, independent charity and in the current situation it is a huge challenge to ensure we are there to provide the support that is so desperately needed. Support from local businesses, community groups and individuals, are vitally important to enable Lighthouse to sustain and develop our services not just now but in the coming months and years.

Here in Suffolk and the UK as a whole we are still seeing an increase in victims of domestic abuse. In July/August this year we supported 450 women through our Women's Centre. Our Families & Children's Worker is providing support that the children also so desperately need to help them recover, this includes groups sessions with mum and also one to one sessions, so that the child can explore and express their feelings. Our Community Worker continues to establish links with other organisations to ensure we are reaching those who find it more difficult to make contact. Our Refuge continues to see a steady flow of women and families arriving who need safe emergency accommodation.

We also provide Domestic Abuse Awareness training and consultancy for business, agencies and charities, this work is hugely important so that everyone is aware of domestic abuse, what it is, the signs and very importantly how to react to a discloser and where to sign post. Our healthy relationship programmes, which are delivered in schools, ensures that children and young people can recognise the difference between a healthy and unhealthy relationship.

Thank you again for your valued support, we take great pride in our mission and accomplishments, and with your help we can continue to support those in need.

Rotarian John Norman Challenge

This past week John gave the following update on Progress:

When my oncologist informed me that my cancer had returned, despite having my stomach removed, I suggested taking part in the 100 day challenge. I suggested that I would try and cycle everyday for 100 days, but he forewarned me that I would struggle, not with the cancer but with the effects of the chemotherapy. Towards the end of the challenge, he was proved right, some days I was feeling so ill I was reluctant to get up, and certainly didn't want to go outside. But cycle to the gym I did, and on Friday 27th October I achieved 100 continuous days.

The worst days cycling were actually the 19th and 20th October, during storm Babet, which brought continuous rain from dawn to late evening. I risked cycling in the rain and added the day to my total.

Amazingly, and to my complete surprise I have raised £10,000, way beyond the couple of hundred I expected (thank you). To be added to this total is a further £800 gift aid, and this grand total from less than 200 supporters (each of whom has been incredibly generous).

The problem now is decisions on the project like to contribute. Every little helps!

(or projects) to which Rotary can contribute. I'm dreaming of a building, something like the shed at Bike Active, a project to which a number of Rotarians can contribute. Ideally the charity should contribute some 50% of the cost of the basic structure but all of this is negotiable, we just need a suitable lead.
