

# A success story! Glenda Price, from Stowmarket SugarCraft Club

As we arrived on 5th December our eyes were drawn to a large number of Christmas cakes on display. How attractive they looked. Several of us were able to look more closely at the cakes: they were skilfully made with great attention to detail. The cheeseboard cake particularly caught my eye. After our delicious lunch, Glenda Price of the Stowmarket SugarCraft Club told us that all the Christmas cakes on display had been made by members of her SugarCraft Club. 'SugarCraft' was a new word for many of us. Glenda explained that sugar is the basis for all of the decorations on their Christmas cakes. Club members only make Christmas cakes. Their aim is to raise money for St. Elizabeth Hospice. Since 2019 the club has raised £31,147. for the hospice. What an achievement!







The idea for selling Christmas cakes to benefit the hospice started n 2019 when Glenda approached the hospice shop in Stowmarket to see whether they would be willing to display some of her Christmas cakes in the window. They responded positively. One of the things that motivated Glenda is the fact that her husband regularly uses the hospice as he has a life limiting problem. Sales were such that other club members started making Christmas cakes to be sold at the hospice shop.

There are 15 members in the club (including two men). Early on Glenda was approached by a businessman who told her that it would be good financially if the project had a sponsor. The upshot was that Preton of Woolpit became their sponsor. In taking this on, Preton agreed that every pound which the SugarCraft Club earned would be matched by Preton.

Glenda reckons that 130 more Christmas cakes will be sold this year. Cakes are kept in the shop for two weeks after a person has paid for a cake.

Because the cakes are wrapped all ingredients must be listed. Donations are given by the public as cash or ingredients. A local farmer is providing eggs for the cakes. Social media is used to promote cake sales. It was very inspiring to hear about the SugarCraft Club's achievements under the capable leadership of Glenda Price. After the talk members made a beeline to buy the Christmas cakes. Our Inner Wheel visitors also bought cakes.

# Rotañan John Norman receives Freedom of Ipswich

On Wednesday 15th November 2023 John was given the Freedom of Ipswich at a Special Meeting of the Ipswich Borough Council. Ipswich Rotarian John Norman was made Honorary Freeman of the Borough of Ipswich. Previous persons given this honour have been Bobby Robson, Lord Kitchener and Admiral Lord Nelson. Speaking at the event, the Mayor of Ipswich, Councillor Lynne Mortimer and others, described John as an "Ipswich icon", who had spent much of his time in the town promoting and safeguarding its history.

On leaving school in Burton-on-Trent aged 16, John decided to make the construction industry his career of choice, a decision that in time saw him move to Ipswich in 1979, where he joined Suffolk College, initially as a lecturer and later as Head of Construction. Outside of his professional life John sat on several Suffolk and Ipswich oriented boards and committees and has been an assiduous researcher and of Ipswich's history, writing some two hundred articles on 'Ipswich Icons' in local newspapers. As a long-time member and Chairman of the Ipswich Society John can often be heard on the local radio or television giving the Ipswich Society point of view on local issues.

John, together with his wife Christine has shared their home, life, and experiences with numerous foster children, while John himself has been involved with countless youth groups including the Scouts, Duke of Edinburgh Awards, and Operation Raleigh.

Joining the Rotary Club of Ipswich in 1999, John has always been a strong proponent of "hands-on" Rotary, particularly in the fields of Youth and Community projects—witness, amongst many other activities, the erection and maintenance of "Bike Active" sheds at Alton Water. For his contributions to Rotary and the community in Ipswich, John was given recognition as a Paul Harris Fellow in October 2016.

More recently, following the diagnosis of his having terminal cancer, and as part of Ipswich Rotary's centenary celebrations, John set himself the target of cycling every day for 100 days. Notwithstanding his being in hospital for treatment during this time, and the ravages of Storm Babet, John kept up his challenge, even cycling round the hospital car park, until he had successfully completed his target. In the process on undertaking this personal challenge John raised over £10,000. A truly inspirational Rotarian who in both his professional and personal lives embodies the Rotary credo of "Service above Self".

# NHS-funded online mindfulness course for Rotary members

I am contacting you in the hope that you are able to spread the word of a free NHS online mindfulness course to your members, or anyone personally you know who will benefit.

We have now run for 3 years, 3 courses a year and have had many Rotary participants from Suffolk, many of whom have attended a second time.

We are delighted to have now received funding from NHS East and West Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Groups and Suffolk Community Foundation to provide free online mindfulness courses to support older adults aged 65 and over and carers and former carers living in Suffolk.

The Gatehouse Charity is offering an online mindfulness course that is fully funded to support older adults (over 65) and carers or former carers in Suffolk. The course is led by a clinical psychologist who is also a mindfulness teacher.

The course is based on the mindfulness-based stress reduction course developed by John Kabat Zin but has been adapted for these populations.

We have had really good feedback from participants, and we have found that it improves peoples' attention and memory, as well as reducing loneliness, low mood, stress, anxiety and chronic pain. We have also worked with memory clinic patients in the NHS, and it has been shown to improve memory functioning in people in the early stages of dementia, mild cognitive impairment, or people suffering from carer stress. Many participants have found it simply helps them deal with day-to-day stresses.

We currently have courses running on 8th or 31st January 2024 which involves a weekly meeting via Zoom for 1.5 hours for 6 weeks.

Places are free but limited to around 15.



Alan and Catherine wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year.


Alan and Catherine are very grateful for the many


