RECENT MEETINGS AND EVENTS

Hannah Walker, from Brave Futures By Eric Barnett

Hannah Walker, who is Fundraising & Marketing Manager for the local charity *Brave Futures* gave us an insightful and thought-provoking talk on the 6th of February about the role and work of her organization.

Operating within Suffolk and Norfolk, Brave Futures is a specialist support service for children and young people up to the age 18 years who have experienced sexual abuse, and the Charity's involvement begins after the child has disclosed being sexually abused to the police and/ or Social Services.

Its main purpose is to provide a safe environment within which the children or young people can make sense of the confusion they feel and where they learn the skills they need to rebuild their futures, manage the traumas they have experienced and move on from being simply a victim or survivor.

Hannah said there is now a greater readiness to discuss child sexual abuse and to find solutions that provide better protection for children.

As to the scale of the problem, Hannah commented that as many as 1 in 10 children suffer some form of abuse, and there were 14,500 children in Suffolk who were in need of help and support; compare that with the fact that Brave Futures are only able to help 350 children per year.

Hannah emphasised that the sexual abuse of children was preventable, with children being unwilling participants – in fact, sometimes victims were too young to know what had been done to them; Brave Futures youngest client is only 2 years old.

She added that of the number of cases referred to the police, some 50% were accorded the status of "No further action" and only 17% of the perpetrators had action taken against them.

On a more positive note, Hannah said that they had just launched an education programme for 7-11 year-olds and the charity was going into schools to promote better awareness of the problem amongst that age group, and to empower children more widely.

She added that Childline was very supportive of their work and offered an excellent reporting channel.

Our members were very appreciative of Hannah's presentation, which underlined her commitment and dedication to the elimination of an abuse which is totally unacceptable and blights the lives of so many young children.

Tim Pennick of 'Sound On', the Ipswich and District Talking Newspaper By Roger Gilles

President George Woodward made an unusual introduction at the February 13th lunch when he welcomed a guide dog to the top table. Kola's behaviour was, however, impeccable as his master, Tim Pennick, introduced us to 'Sound On', the Ipswich & District Talking Newsletter, which he and his wife Rachel have organised since the late 70's.

The Talking Newsletter service is largely unknown to those with sight but, to people who are visually impaired, it is a vital link with regional news and items of local interest. The process of distributing this information is simple but labour intensive. Those using the services provided by Microsoft will be familiar with the 'cut and paste' function on their computer or laptop, whereby editing is achieved electronically. For Tim and Rachel and their volunteers, however, the term cut and paste means exactly that; in their offices in the Ip-City Centre, each Thursday is spent selecting reports from the East Anglian Daily times and the Ipswich Star and literally cutting them out and pasting them on to card.

These articles are then read out by volunteers and recorded on memory sticks which are then sent by post to around 200 people in Ipswich and surrounding towns. This 'low-tech' approach is part of the appeal for the Sound On's audience, as the majority of people using the service are in their 80s and 90s. Many people of advancing years are unused to coping with the restrictions imposed by failing eyesight and therefore welcome a simple system of keeping up with local news and events.

The memory sticks are delivered in purpose-made pouches and are easily inserted into a player provided by Tim and his volunteers — those with a large circular volume control are best, as they are easier to operate than later push-button models. Having listened to the news, members simply return the pouch and memory stick to the Newspaper by post. In addition to weekly news, Sound On issues a 6-monthly audio newsletter which is distributed by the same process, and

both the weekly news and the newsletter are available online via Google. All the hardware: memory sticks, pouches and audio players are made available free of charge to members, and the organisation is entirely voluntary.

The history of Talking Newspapers can be traced back to the early 60s when tape recorders became more easily available to the public. Those with early record players may recall the 16 rpm speed on the turntable — this speed was intended for talking books, which meant that books could be enjoyed by those unable to read and those who hadn't mastered Braille. Very little local news, however, was available by this method and it was the tape recorder which opened up the possibility of local audio news agencies.

There are now nearly 350 Talking Newspapers around the country and in Ipswich Tim and Rachel can draw upon a pool of around 50 local volunteers. Sound On relies entirely on voluntary contributions to support the rent for their small office in the Ip-City Centre and all the necessary hardware needed to bring the news to local visually impaired people.

At our lunch, Tim and Rachel expressed their thanks for the contribution that the Club made to Sound On and Alan Forsdike, in giving a vote of thanks, mentioned that some of our members were volunteers. He said that he recognised Norman Haines' voice as one of the newsreaders when his mother used the service!

Phil Bigley OBE, from Hostage International By Allan Gosling

Phil Bigley OBE, from Hostage International, and who has lived in Ipswich for 42 years, gave an informative and interesting talk on the 20th of February.

His charity was formed 20 years ago by Sir Terry Waite and a group of former hostages and family members who wanted to ensure that anyone going through a kidnaping incident has access to a supporting network with specialist care, all free of charge.

Phil spoke of his Brother Ken, who was working



in Abu Dabi rebuilding utilities in Bagdad, when he and two Americans were taken hostage. All three were executed, despite the great help he had



from Sir Terry Waite.

We were told of several hostages taken in Niger, Somalia and Syria, some of whom were released and others killed, and how his charity supports returning hostages and their families.

The vote of thanks was given by Ewan Dodds.



Proceeds from the 2023 John Riches Race Night By Steve Runnacles

On Tuesday 6th February at lunch, Anne Riches made a presentation to Jon Neal of Suffolk MIND matching the proceeds from the 2023 John Riches memorial race night.

Anne had kindly matched the proceeds of the evening held last march, where $\pounds 1,822$ were raised, and, therefore, Suffolk MIND received $\pounds 3,644$ in total.



Earlier this year, the Club was approached by Becky Murton, mother of two and a half year old Henrietta (Etta) who suffers from T-Cell acute lymphoblastic leukaemia having been referred by Cancer Support Suffolk.

Becky was looking for a contribution to a new buggy, as Etta has outgrown her current one. The request for funds was supported by a donation of £150 from our Community Support Fund, and on Monday 12th February, our President met with Becky and Etta at Needham Lakes to hand over the buggy.

Etta is a content little girl, however, she needs to be fed by a tube for 6 hours a day. It was very distressing to hear that in her very short life, she has had three cardiac arrests, and in each case her parents said their goodbyes to her! The very good news is she has responded positively to chemotherapy and is now in remission.

On a separate note, her mother is due to have a stoma bag fitted in the near future.

Our president wishes both Etta and Becky, and the rest of her family, all the very best for their future treatments and happiness.



It was lovely to meet you both today. Thank you so much for your help! We wouldn't have been able to get the buggy we needed without your help.

We have never had to ask for any kind of help prior to cancer, and it's not an easy thing to do when you're very used to working hard to provide for your family. Unfortunately, life can change overnight.

When we were at Addenbrooke's last week, we got there at 11:00 Pm and there was no cot for Etta, so she slept in the buggy until one became available a few hours later. It's a great size for her, being bigger now, and she's able to lay down, where I can see her through the cover, and it carries her machine too. She isn't always able to walk or bear her weight, so it's going to be very well used.

It's perfect. Thank you.
